HUD Entitlement Funds

The City of Vancouver is the administrative authority for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development’s Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships allocation.

CDBG funding was used to fund a variety of programs and projects that benefit low- and moderate-income county residents, including:

- infrastructure improvements
- case management
- homeowner rehabilitation programs
- community facilities
- fair housing initiatives

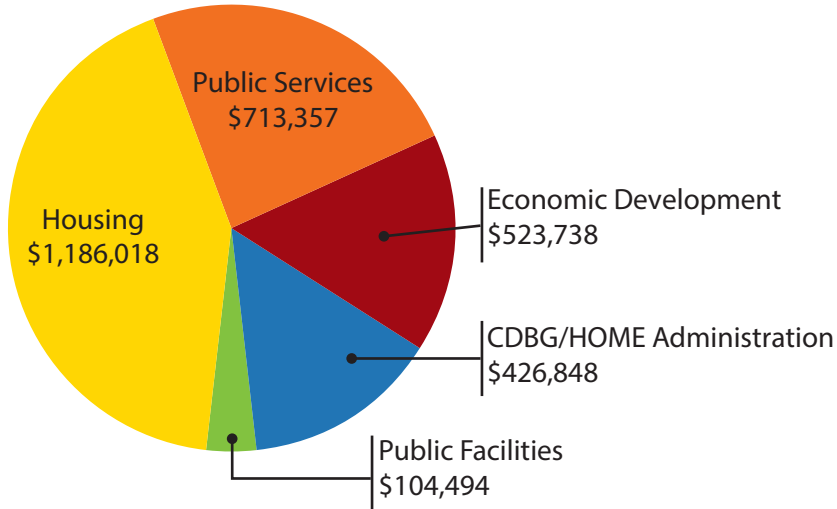
HOME funding was used to construct new housing and provide rental assistance to formerly homeless families.
